The year 2011 has come to a close and Sunny Hill continues to experience success and enjoy accomplishment and achievement towards the fulfillment of the facility's mission. Though we have lost treasured residents who have become part of our family and bid farewell to many of our long-term staff who left for retirement or to follow other opportunities, the year 2012 looks to be another year of continued success for our residents, staff and community. The following is a recap of last year's accomplishments and our cornerstone plans for the new year of 2012 at Sunny Hill:

Resident Centered Care will continue to be the centerpiece of the daily mission at Sunny Hill. It does and will continue to drive every decision and determine every move made.

Creating relationships and honoring choices is what resident-centered care is all about. Work will continue on modifying schedules to accommodate the needs and desires of the residents and work to keep the residents "meaningfully engaged". It is the responsibility of **ALL STAFF** to make sure our residents enjoy the highest quality of life possible. In the past year, changes to how the residents receive their meals, including the pilot program of Dietary Staff providing wait service and room tray service began. The pilot program will continue so that the entire dining room will receive wait service and plans are being made to provide dining service at only one seating vs. the current two seatings, allowing more time for residents and staff to enjoy activity programs and receive enhanced personal care efforts from unit staff.

Renovation Efforts – The renovations will continue with Fifth Avenue, which is currently ahead of schedule. Fourth Avenue opened in late November, with 42 residents enjoying the more accessible, updated and beautiful surroundings. Meetings are being held this month to determine how the remainder of the facility renovations will be staged. Sunny Hill thanks the Will County Executive Larry Walsh, the Will County Board and the Will County Public Building Commission for their continued support of Sunny Hill.

LPN/RN Model of Care – The unit model of care, which has always been a LPN (unit charge nurses) and C.N.A. model is being changed (through attrition) to a RN/LPN/C.N.A. model of care on the day and afternoon shifts. This will provide more experience and professional consistency, supervisory coverage and a smoother and more thorough continuity of care between our physicians, the area hospitals and facility staff – with a primary goal of stopping unneeded readmissions to the hospitals from Sunny Hill.

Professional Training – The key words for 2012 will continue to be **CUSTOMER SERVICE** and **EXCELLENCE**. Staff training will continue to address cultural diversity, professional conduct and behavior, ethics, customer service, communication and dealing with elderly behavior and medical issues.

The new year of 2012 will continue to provide Sunny Hill wonderful opportunities to identify areas in which improvement can be and should be made and to strengthen our commitment to resident-centered care – which is the strongest measure of resident, family, employee and public satisfaction.

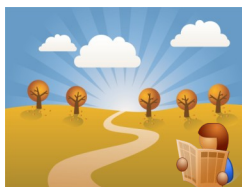

THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

COMPLIMENT/CONCERN FORMS—Reporting forms are located in our information rack in our front lobby and from any department head or unit nurse. Please feel free to fill out these forms or ask for assistance. We are committed to making the stay of each of our residents as comfortable and wonderful as possible. All forms are sent to our Administrator and investigated.

ACCOMPANYING RESIDENTS TO OUTSIDE APPOINTMENTS—Many of our residents leave the facility to go to physician's offices to receive services. Family members should make arrangements to accompany their loved one to outside appointments, including riding with your loved one in the med-car. This allows you, as a family member, to provide your input to the physician, improves the communication process and allows you to receive any information first-hand.

WEEKEND SUPERVISOR AVAILABLE - There is an additional supervisor on weekend duty. Department Heads such as our Administrator, Director and Assistant Director of Nursing, and Social Service Director are available on assigned weekends to help with any needed tours, concerns, meals, etc.

NEWS FROM PUBLIC AID—2012

When you go into a nursing home, your spouse may keep your home, your car and your household furnishings. The Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) office will then determine the value of your other property, such as bank accounts or certificates of deposit. You may transfer other property to your spouse or to someone else for the sole benefit of your spouse. Depending on how much property your spouse already has (not counting things like the house and the car), you may give your spouse property valued up to \$113,640 for 2012.* The amount will increase each year. Your HFS caseworker will tell you the actual amount you may give to your spouse.

Protecting Income for Your Spouse and Dependents

When HFS decides the amount of income you have to apply to the cost of your nursing care, deductions are permitted if you give money to your spouse and any other dependent family members. They include dependent children under age 21, dependent adult children, dependent parents or dependent brothers or sisters of either you or your spouse. Depending on circumstances, for 2012 you may give up to \$2,841.00 of your income per month to your spouse. For 2012, you may also give up to \$570.33 per month to each dependent family member.* These amounts may increase each year. Your HFS office will notify you of the actual amount you may give.

If You Receive Veterans Benefits

Your eligibility for veterans benefits may be reduced or discontinued if you give income (from any source) to your family. Your eligibility for veterans benefits is determined by the Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA), based in part on the amount of nursing care expenses you are required to pay. If the amount of income you have to apply to the cost of your nursing care is reduced or eliminated because you are giving income to your family, your veterans benefits may be reduced or discontinued by the DVA.

If you are giving income (from any source) to your family, contact your local DVA field office. A representative from the office will help you determine your continued eligibility for veterans benefits.

Transfer of Property to Qualify for Medical Benefits

Property transfers may affect your eligibility. If you or your spouse have transferred property for less than it's worth, other than as described above, you may be subject to a penalty period for nursing care services, supportive living facility services and for in-home care services through the Department of Aging (DoA). If otherwise eligible, you remain entitled to other covered medical services. Transfers that may affect your eligibility are those made within 36 months (60 months for specific trusts) of the date of: your application, or your entry into a nursing home, supportive living facility or the date you apply for/receive in-home care services through DoA.

If the HFS decides that you are subject to a penalty period, the penalty begins with the month of the transfer and continues for as long as the uncompensated value of the transferred property would meet the monthly cost of nursing care at the private rate. However, if a transfer is made during a penalty period and the HFS decides that you are subject to an additional penalty period, the penalty begins with the month following the month the previous penalty period ends.

If you receive medical benefits, your local HFS will inform you of the penalty period.

Liens and Claims

The state has the legal right to recover the amount of assistance people receive through the medical benefits program. The state can file a lien on real property you own while a nursing home resident and can claim against your estate or the estate of your spouse. The state will seek to recover money equal to the amount of medical benefits you received. CDC SAYS “TAKE 3 ACTIONS TO FIGHT FLU”

Period of contagiousness

You may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick. Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning 1 day **before** symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days **after** becoming sick. Some people, especially young children and people with weakened immune systems, might be able to infect others for an even longer time.



Take time to get a flu vaccine.

CDC recommends a yearly flu vaccine as the first and most important step in protecting against flu viruses.

While there are many different flu viruses, the flu vaccine protects against the three viruses that research suggests will be most common.

The 2011-2012 vaccine will protect against an influenza A H3N2 virus, an influenza B virus and the H1N1 virus that emerged in 2009 to cause a pandemic.

Everyone 6 months of age and older should get a flu vaccine as soon as the 2011-2012 vaccines are available.

Vaccination of high risk persons is especially important to decrease their risk of severe flu illness.

People at high risk of serious flu complications include young children, pregnant women, people with chronic health conditions like asthma, diabetes or heart and lung disease and people 65 years and older.

Vaccination also is important for health care workers, and other people who live with or care for high risk people to keep from spreading flu to high risk people.

Children younger than 6 months are at high risk of serious flu illness, but are too young to be vaccinated. People who care for them should be vaccinated instead.



Take everyday preventive actions to stop the spread of germs.

Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.

Wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.

Try to avoid close contact with sick people.

If you are sick with flu-like illness, CDC recommends that you stay home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone except to get medical care or for other necessities. (Your fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.)

While sick, limit contact with others as much as possible to keep from infecting them.



Take flu antiviral drugs if your doctor prescribes them.

If you get the flu, antiviral drugs can treat your illness.

Antiviral drugs are different from antibiotics. They are prescription medicines (pills, liquid or an inhaled powder) and are not available over-the-counter.

Antiviral drugs can make illness milder and shorten the time you are sick. They may also prevent serious flu complications.

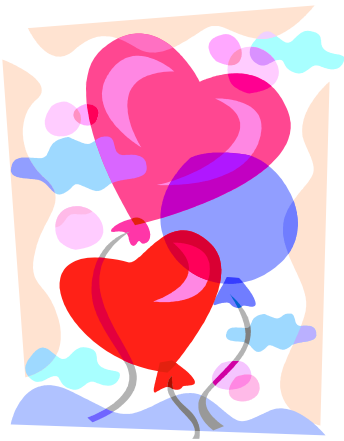
It's very important that antiviral drugs be used early (within the first 2 days of symptoms) to treat people who are very sick (such as those who are hospitalized) or people who are sick with flu symptoms and who are at increased risk of severe flu illness, such as pregnant women, young children, people 65 and older and people with certain chronic health conditions.

Flu-like symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills and fatigue. Some people also may have vomiting and diarrhea. People may be infected with the flu, and have respiratory symptoms without a fever.

How flu spreads

Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might also get flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, eyes or possibly their nose.
